Hereas divers good
Lawes and Statutes,
most necessary for
these times, have, during the happie Reigne of Queene
ELIZABETH, and of Our late
Father of blessed memorie, and
since our comming to the Crowne
of England, been with great wisedome, peitie, and policie, made and
enasted in Parliament, as well for
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the charitable reliefe of aged and impotent poore people, not able by their labours to get their liuings and for the training op of Youth in honest and profitable. Trades and Mysteries, by putting them forth to be Apprentices, as also for the setting to worke of idle persons, who being of abilitie to worke, in. some kinde or other, doe neuerthelesse, resuse to labour, and either wander up and downe the Citie and Countrey begging, or which is worse, maintaine themselues by filebing and stealing; And for the punishment of fundry Rogues and Vagabonds, and setting of them to worke: . And for the suppressing of that odious and loath some sinne of Drunkennesse; And the repressing of idlenesse, the roote of somany eurls: The due execution of which, and the like lawes and Statutes, would prevent and cut of many offences and crimes of high nature.

A ND whereas we are informed that the defect of the execution of the said good and politique Lawes and Constitutions in that behalfe made, proceedeth espicially from the neglect of duetie in some of Our Instices of the Peace and other Officers, Magistrates, and Ministers of the Peace, within the severall Counties, Cities and townes

Corporate of this our Realme of England, and Dominion of Wales, to whom the care and trust of seeing the said Lawes to be put in execution, is by the sayd Lawes principally comitted, which remissenesse con neglect of duty doth grow and arise from this, That by the most of the sayd Lawes, there are little or no Penalties or Forfeitures at all inflicted vpon the said Iustices of Peace, Magistrates, Officers and Ministers for not performing their duties in that behalfe, or if any be, yet partly by reason of the smallnesse thereof, and partly by reason of their pomer and authoritiein their seuerall pla-

ces, whereby they hold others vnder them in ame, there are fem or no Complaints or Informations made of the neglects and want of due execution of the Offices of the said Iustices and other Ministers; and although the care and diligence of our Indges and Inflices of Assebe neuer so great, yet by rea-Son of the shortnesse of their Asizes and Sessions in every County, and multiplicitie of bufinesse, they neither have due information of the said neglects, nor in those times, can take such exact courses as were requisite for redresse of such generall abuses and inconveniences so bigbly importing the publique good of

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this Our Realme, by reason whereof the said fustices of Peace, Magistrates, Officers and Ministers, are now of late in most parts of this Our Kingdome growne secure in their said negligence, and the said politique and necessarie Lawes and Statutes laid ande or little regarded as Lames of small vse and consequence, whereas upon the present making of the said Lawes, the same being then duely executed, as also at this day in some Counties and parts of this Our Kingdome, where Some Iustices of Peace and other Magistrates doe duely and diligently execute the same, there euidently appeareth great reformati-

on, benefit and safety to redound to the Commonwealth, And likewise when as there was care taken, and diligence vsed to have the Lames concerning charitable vses, mel executed, and all pious gifts to bee imployed according to the good intent of the Donors, these poore people were better relieved then now they are: All which We taking into Our Princely care, for the preservation of the common Peace of this Realme, the performance of mens pious intentions in their gifts of Charitie, and the generall good and quiet of Our Subiects.

After long and mature deliberation, finding that there is no bet-

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termayes or meanes to have the said Lawes and Statutes put in full execution, then by committing the trust and oversight thereof to the speciall care and industrie of certaine persons of principall Place, Dignitie and Order neere unto Our Person; who vpon their diligent inquirie bow the said Lames and Statutes are put in execution, may be able upon all occasions from time to time to give Us particular information thereof, and by their approoued Wisedomes, experience and Iudgements, give Directions and Instructions from time to time for the better execution of the said Statutes.

Know

Knowse therefore that Wee out of that long experience and full af-Surance Wee baue bad of the great integritie, wisedome, sidelitie and industrie of you, and every of you; Haue constituted, authorized and appointed you to bee Our Commishoners, and by these presents doe constitute, authorise and appoint, and strictly require you, or any foure or more of you Our Commissioners either by examination upon Oath, or without Oath, or by all and every fuch good and lawfull meanes as to you, or any foure or more of you, in your Wisedomes and Iudgements shal seeme convenient and requisite from time to time from henceforth

to make Inquirie, and thereby to informe your selues bow all and every the Lames and Statutes now in force, which any way concerne the reliefe of impotent or poore people, the binding out of Apprentices, the setting to worke of poore children, and such other poore people, as being able or willing to morke, baue. no stocke or meanes to imploy themselues; The compelling and forcing such lazie widle persons to worke, as being of bodies able and firong, doe neuerthelesse resuse to labour; the maintenance, gouernement, and well ordering of houses of Correction and other places for reliefe of poore indigent and impo-

impotent people, the Rating, Colledling, and imployment of all such Summes, as by the Statute of the three and fourtieth of ELIZA-BETH, are appointed for the reliefe of Souldiers and Mariners, the punishment or setting on worke of Rogues and Vagabonds: And all Lawes and Statutes now in force for the repressing of Drunkennesse and Idlenesse, the reforming of abuses committed in Innes and Alehouses, the abridging of the number of Alehouses, and the well ordering of such as be licensed, the keeping of Watches and Wards duely, and how other publique seruices for God, the King, and the ComCommon-wealth, are put in practice and executed.

To which end and purpose, to you Our Commissioners, or any fixe or more of you, We give full power and authoritie from time to time hereafter, to give such Directions and Instructions, and by all other good and lamfull meanes to set downe, and give such Orders and Directions, as that all and every the said Lames and other necessarie Statutes may bee duely and effe-Etually executed, and the Paines and Penalties thereof leuied and imployed, according to the purport and true meaning of the same Lames

And

And whereas no Nation of the world bath provided more liberally, or ordeined better Lawes for due imployment of Lands, Goods, and Stockes of money, given to charitable vses, then this Our Kingdome of England bath done; Yet neuerthelesse the said Bounties and charitable Gifts haue not beene imployed according to the minde and intent of the Givers, by reason of some Deuices, Frauds, Breach of Trust, Aime at private Gaine, and partly by the negligence of those that have beene trusted to performe the same.

Therefore Our Will and expresse Pleasure is, That those Sta-

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tutes of the thirty ninth and fourtie third of Elizabeth, and all other Lames and Statutes concerning Hospitals, Almes-houses, Meisons de Dieu, and other pious Donations, Collections, or publike Gifts for the benefit of the Poore, or publike Workes, be strictly inquired and put in execution. And all Deeds of Foundations, Charters, Wills, Deuices, Dispositions of Lands, Goods, Annuities, or Rents, giuen, appointed, or intended to any the houses aforesaid, or to any charitable vse or publike Worke, be diligently sought out and discouered, to the end there may bee an imployment of all the Profits, according to the

the Will and Minde of the Donors or Founders.

And Wee doe further by these Presents, give full power and authority unto you, or any fixe or more of you, to call vnto you for your asistance in the Premisses, when you shall see it needfull, all, or any of Our Iustices of Asize, as often as you shall see cause, and to give Such Directions and instructions by your Letters, or otherwise, as well to Our said Instices of Asize, Oyer and Terminer, and Gaole deliuery, for their seuerall Circuits: As also to Our Iustices, Maiors, Bayliffes, and other head officers, within Cities and Boroughs, Clerkes

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Clerkes of the Asife and Sessions, and other Officers and Ministers within Our seuerall Counties and Shires of this our Realme of England and Dominion of Wales, and the severall Divisions of the same, as to you, or any fixe or more of you in your wisedomes shall seeme meete and requisite, and shall bee agreeable to the Lawes and Statutes of this Our Realme, for the better execution of the Lawes and Statutes in the time to come. All which Directions, Instructions, and Orders, at any time or times heereafter so to be made or taken by you, or any fixe or more of you, by force of these presents: Wee Will and straitly

straitly Charge and Command by these presents, to bee sincerely and duely from time to time, obeyed, observed, and kept, by all and every Officer and Officers, fustice and Justices, Person and Persons, to

whom it shall appertaine.

And We do bereby further wil and require you, that you or any foure or more of you, doe from time to time give vnto Vs particular and true information of the care and industry of Our fustices of Peace in their severall Divisions, Maiors, Bailiffes, and bead Officers, in their severall Cities, and Townes Corporate, as upon the said inquirie you shall finde to bee diligent in

putting the said Lames, Statutes, Orders and Directions in execution, That so by their service and your report, they appearing to deserve well of their King and countrey, may receive not onely good acceptance at Our bands, but all due incouragement and comfort to continue in their well doings; And if contrariwise you shall finde any of Our said Iustices of Peace, or other the persons before named to be negligent and remisse in their severall places and duties touching the performance and execution of the said Lawes and Statutes committed to their Charge, or the Orders and Directions given by you, or any hxa

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sixe of you for the better execution of the said Statutes: Then Our pleasure is, that you doe likewise certifie the names of such as you shall find so remisse and negligent, that accordingly order may be taken for their remooning and displacing out of the Commission of the Peace, as men unworthy of their said Trust and Places; As also deserving to receive such further Punishment in Our Court of Star-chamber, or otherwise, as may be by Law inslicted upon them.

And further wee doe by these Presents give unto you, or any fixe or more of you, full power and authoritie to doe and execute all and

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euery other lawfull and necessarie Att and Atts, thing and things for the better and more due Execution of the Premisses or any of them, as you or any sixe, or more of you, shall in your Wisedomes and Iudgements thinke to bee sit and conuenient.

And because you that are attendants upon Our Person, or otherwise imployed in Our Services cannot at all times bee in Person in the severall Shires of this Our Kingdome, to execute this Our Commission in such sort as We have appointed it: And for that it will be very sit and requisite for you to have persons of Trust under you, who

who may faithfully assist you in the execution of this Our Commission.

Wee doe therefore give unto you. for your better Aide and Assistance, and the better performance of this Our Service, full power and authoritie from time to time, to Asigne, Appoint and Constitute by your writing under your Hands and Seales or the Hands and Seales of any fixe, or more of you, such sufficient meete persons as you, or any fixe of you, in your discretions shall from time to time thinke fit and appoint to bee your Deputies in every or any Countie, Citie, Borough or towne Corporate of this Our King.

And Wee doe give vnto such persons, so to be by you deputed, assigned, and appointed, as aforesaid, or to any two, three, or more of them full power and authority to doe and execute in our said Counties, Cities, Boroughs, and Townes Corporate, as well within Liberties as without; All and every thing and things, which by vertue of this Our Commission, is to you our principall Commissioners intrusted and committed, or which you, or any of you Our Commissioners, if you were personally present, might or ought to doe; They your Said Deputies pursuing pursuing such Directions and frastructions from time to time as you or any sixe of you shall give white them in writing; And the better to enable them so to doe, you shall deliver to such deputies as you shall make in every Countie, Citie, or Towne corporate as aforesaid, a duplicate, or true transcript of this Our Commission, subscribed with your bands, or under the hands of sixe of you at the least.

And Wee doe further by the tenour of these presents, will and command, and doe give full power and
authoritie to Our Lord Chancelour,
or Lord Keeper of Our great Seale
for the time being, to cause severall
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Commissions to be made foorth, vnder Our great Seale of England, to such persons of trust and quality, as any fixe, or more of you shall from time to time nominate vnto him, and shall so signifie onto him by writing under your handsto the same tenour and effect, in every material thing, as in these Our Letters Patents is expressed, with a clause to bee inserted in enery such Commission and Commissions, commaunding such persons so to be nominated, that they certifie all their proceedings therevponto you Our foresaid Commisioners, or to any fixe of you, at fuch times and places, as you, or any fixe of you shall appoint.

In witnesse whereof, Wee have caused these Our Letters to bee made Patents: Witnesse Our selfe at VV estminster the fift day of Ianuary, in the sixt yeere of our Reigne.

HAT the Iustices of Peace of euery
Shire within the
Realme doe divide

themselues, and allot amongst themselues what Iustices of the Peace, and what Hundreds shall attend monethly at some certaine places of the Shire. And at this day and place, the High Constables, Petty-Constables, and Churchwardens, and Overleers for the Poore of

those Hundreds, shall attend the said suffices. And there inquirie shall be made, and Information taken by the suffices, how every of these Officers in their severall places have done their duties in Execution of the Lawes mentioned in the Commission annexed, and what persons have offended against any of the said Lawes.

III.

Volume of the Lawes of the Lawes of the ded, to bee leavied and brought to the Iustices at their next meeting.

IIIL

Hen the penalties are leavied, the Iustices are to take care that the same be imploied accordingly as by the Statutes are appointed.

FOr incouragement to men that doe informe and prosecute others for offending against these Lawes or any of them, libertie to bee lest to the Iustices of Peace that doe meete to reward the Informer or Prosecutor, out of part of the money leavied vpon his, or their Presentments, or Information.

Though the Statute doe not prescribe this, yet this is not against the Law than giues the penaltie to the Poore,

Poore, which penaltie nor no part thereof would else come unto the poore but by this meanes.

VI.

Hat the seuerall sustices of Peace of euery Shire, doe once euery three moneths certifie an account in VV riting to the high Sheriffe of the Countie, of their proceedings in this way, whom they have punished, what they have leuyed, and how they have imploy-Sheriffe thall certifie fue ti be

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THat the High Sheriffe within foureteene dayes after this Account delinered, do send the same ouer to the lustices of Assize for that County, or to one of them, and the Iustice or Justices that receive the same, to certifie it in the beginning of euery Terme next after, to the Lords Commissioners. And if any of the Iustices of Peace shall faile to make fuch account to the Sheriffe, then the Sheriffe shall certifie such default to the Lords Commissioners.

VIII.

Orders.

VIII.

The Iustices of Assize in euery Circuite, are to enquire, and specially to marke, what Iustices of the Peace are carefull and diligent in execution of these Lawes, and the Directions given, and who are negligent and remisse. And what other things of note happen in their Circuits, to make report thereof to the King, v pon their returne from their Circuits euery halfe yeere.

Hat the Lords of Manors and Townes, take care that their Tenants, and the Pa-

rishioners of every Towne may bee releeued by worke, or otherwise at home, and not suffered to straggle, and begge up and downe in their Parishes.

THat Stewards to Lords and Gentlemen, in keeping their Leetes

Leetes twice a yeere, doe specially enquire upon those Articles that tend to the reformation, or punishment of common offences and abuses: As of Bakers and Brewers, for breaking of Asizes: Of Forestallers, and Regraters: Against Tradesmen of all sorts, for selling with under weights, or at excessive prises, or things vnwholsome, or things made in deceipt : Of people, breakers of houses, common theeues, and their Receivers; baunters of Tauernes, or Alehouses; those that goe in good clothes, and fare well; and none knowes whereof they live; those that bee night-walkers; builders of Cottages, and takers in of Inmates .

Inmates; offences of Victuallers, Artificers, Workmen and Labourers.

III.

That the poore children in euery Parish be put forth Apprentices to husbandry, and other
handy-crafts, and money to be raised in the Parishes for placing
them, according to the Law; and
if any party shall refuse to take the
said Apprentice, being put out according to the Law; such party as shall
refuse to take the said Apprentice,
be to bound ouer to the next quarter
Sessions, or Assistant there to be
bound

bound to his good behausour, or otherwise ordered, as shall bee found fit.

IIII.

That the Statute of Labourers, for retaining of Seruants, and ordering of Wages, betwixt the Servant and the Master be not deluded by private Contracts, before they come to the Statutes, and the common fashion of Essoyning many absent, not to bee allowed of course, as is vsed.

V.

T Hat the weekely taxations for reliefe of the Poore, and other

Directions.

other purposes mentioned in the Statute of 43. Eliz. bee in these times of scarcitie raised to higher Rates in every Parish, then in times to fore were vsed. And Contributions had from other Parishes, to helpe the weaker Parishes, especially from those places where depopulations have beene, some good Contribution to come, for helpe of other Parishes. And where any money or Stocke bath beene, or shall bee given to the reliefe of the Poore in any parish, such Gift to be no occasion of lessening the Rates of the Parish.

Hat the petty Constables in all Parishes, be chosen of the abler sort of Parishioners, and the office not to be put vpon the poorer sort, if it may be.

Atches in the night, and Warding by day, and to be appointed in every Towne and Village for apprehension of Rogues and Vagabonds, and for safety and good order.

VIII.

A N D because it is sound by dayly experience, that the remissenesse and negligence of petty-Constables is a great cause of the swarming of Rogues and beggers, therefore the high Constables in their severall Divisions are specially to be charged to looke unto the petty-Constables, that they vie diligence in their Offices, and the High-Constables to present to the Instices of Peace, the defaults of the petty-Constables, for not punishing the Rogues, or not presenting those that are Relieuers of the Rogues and Beggers, the Law G3 inflicting

inflicting a Penalty vpon the Constable for not punishing them, and vpon such party as shall releeve them.

IX

I F in any Parish there bee sound any persons that live out of Service, or that live idly and will not worke for reasonable wages, or live to spend all they have at the Ale-house, those persons to bee brought by the High Constables, and petty Constables to the Instices at their meetings, there to be ordered and punished as shall be found sit.

T Hat the Correction houses in all Counties may bee made adiogning to the common Prisons, and the Gaoler to be made Gouernour of them, that so he may imploy to worke Prisoners committed for small causes, and so they may learne honestly by labour, and not line idly and miserably long in prison, whereby they are made morfe when they come out then they were when they went in, and where many bouses of Correction are in one County, one of them at least to bee neere the Gaole.

XI.

I Hat no man harbour Rogues in their Barnes, or Outbouseings. And the wandring persons with women and children, to give account to the Constable or Fustice of Peace, where they were marryed, and where their children were Christened; for these people line like Saluages, neither marry nor bury nor Christen, which licentious libertie makes so many delight to be Rogues and Wanderers.

XII.

A Nd because the High wayes in all Counties of England are in great decay, partly so growen, for that men think there is no course by the Common Law, or Order from the State to amend the same: And the worke-dayes appointed by the Statute are so omitted, or idly performed, that there comes little good by them. Therefore the lustices of Peace at these monethly meetings, are to take special care of: and not onely to cause the Surueyors of the High mayes to pre-Jent the Same; but by their cone view, to informe them felues, that

Hereas a Comm.ssion is made by His MA Es-TIE, dated the fift day of la-

nuary, in the sixt yeere of his Reigne, in which the Lords, and others of his Privie Councell, are named Commissioners; It is thought fit for the better execution thereof, to make a Repartition of all the within named Privie Counsellors in this manner, and to this end, That whereas the Realme of England is divided into fixe Circuits, and to every Circuit there is allotted fixe seuerall Shires at the

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least.

least, and two Iudges to ride every of those Shires twice a yeere; So the Iustices of the Peace of those severall Shires, shall give an account monethly of every of those Shires, and the Shiriffe send vp those accompts in such time to the Iudges of the severall Circuits, that they may in the beginning of every Terme, give vp the same to the Lords, and others the Commissioners.

And it is likewise thought fit to assigne sixe Privile Counsellors to take the accompt from the Judges of every the said Circuits; yet this assignation to

be no exclusion, but that all the Commissioners as they have equal power ouer all the Shiriffs, fo they may vie it as occasion shall bee in euery Shire; This distribution of the Counsellors, Commissioners to the seucrall Shires, beeing but to have the businesse of the seuerall Shires more especially tended and performed by them, to whom the seuerall Shires are especially allotted, and if any of the Counfellors see cause for it, they may call vnto them the Judges of that Circuite for their better assistance.
